## GUINNESS CHOCOLATE PUDDINGS

Perfect for a dinner party if you're celebrating on St Patrick's Day - or at any time of year

Butter four $9 \times 5 \mathrm{~cm}$ ramekins and set aside. In a heat proof bowl, put $\mathbf{1 5 0 g}$ unsalted butter, 200 g dark chocolate and a generous pinch of salt. Set in a small pan of just-simmering water and stir until melted, then remove from the heat and leave to cool a little.

Put 90g brown sugar and 3 large eggs in a large mixing bowl and beat with an electric mixer until pale, almost doubled in volume and thick enough to leave a trail when the beaters are lifted. Gently fold in the melted chocolate and 90 ml Guinness. Spoon the mixture into the ramekins, then chill for 1-hour. Heat oven to $\mathbf{4 0 0}{ }^{\mathbf{F}} \mathbf{F}$ and put a baking tray on the top shelf to heat up.

Place the ramekins on the hot baking tray and bake for 18-minutes. Remove from the oven and leave to stand for a minute, then serve with a dollop of whipping cream.

## Profile on Ken Blogg

Ken was born in Norwich, England. His family moved to London where his father worked as a quantity surveyor. They lived with his grandparents and an aunt and uncle in a three bedroom apartment. The post war housing shortage was huge in London. Ken's parents applied for housing for "Married Couple with One Child". After waiting four years, they received notice that a unit was available. Excited, they arrived at the office to sign the rental agreement. As soon as the administrator saw that Ken's mother was pregnant, he tore up the agreement and added their name to the wait list for "Married Couple with Two Children". On the train back home, they decided to move to Canada. They arrived in Toronto in 1957.

After graduating high school, Ken went off to University to become - he had no idea. He was the first person in his extended family to do so. No pressure there. After a successful first year he returned to year two, but soon decided that he really didn't know what he wanted to do so he left. Over the next few years Ken tried a variety of jobs including sales, radio announcing and hotel management. He continued to attend university part time out of respect for his family. As he approached graduation, he discovered that the owner of the company for whom he worked was not an honest person. Ken walked away. Now unemployed, but with a degree, a friend suggested that he try teaching. "Why," asked Ken, "would I want to do that?" Two reasons," replied his friend, "you get eight weeks paid holiday a year and there are eight women teachers for each male and with those odds, even you could get a date!" Ken gave it a try.

After his first 10 minutes in front of his first 'practice teaching' class, Ken knew that this is what he was meant to do. Over the next 34 years there were only a handful of days when Ken could not wait to get to work. And his friend was correct; Ken did get a date, with Fran, and she became his wife.

As well as a fulfilling career, teaching provided wonderful opportunities to see the world. In 1979 the Canadian Embassy in Moscow was looking for teachers to teach at the Anglo-American School which was run jointly by the American, British and Canadian embassies to teach the children of embassy employees. Ken and Fran answered the call. It was an exciting time to be "behind the iron curtain." It gave an entirely new view on the spy movies of the day.

Returning home, Ken and Fran started their family and they have two children - a son and a daughter. Both agreed that they wanted to have a parent at home until the children started school. As a team, they decided to share the responsibility by job sharing. It was a concept that was becoming popular where two people shared one job so a parent could be home for at least half the time. Up to that point it was usually two women who shared the job. Ken and Fran became one of the first male/female professional couples to do so. It made the media and Ken was interviewed by Peter Gzowski. (It was Fran's turn to work that morning)!

After fifteen years of teaching, Ken decided to become a Principal and returned to school to obtain his Master's Degree. (It's much easier when you know what you want).

Throughout his career Ken took advantage of opportunities that came his way. In Ottawa he headed the Focus on Future program that was designed to give each student an equal opportunity to succeed, regardless of their families economic circumstances. He was on the first Board of Directors of the Education Foundation of Ottawa. In Toronto he was a part of the team that built a multi-purpose community facility. It included school classrooms, a community gymnasium, community meeting rooms, a public library, a swimming pool and a daycare centre.

Ken has always enjoyed the outdoors. He was an active camper, hiker, and skier and for 40 years he had an annual canoe trip through Algonquin Park with his father.

Ken and Fran loved to travel. As well as North America, they have explored Europe, walked on the Great Wall of China, strolled the Parthenon, rode camels across Egyptian desert, climbed the Cheops Pyramid, sat in a hot spring at the base of Mount Fiji and walked around "Mount Doom", Mount Ruapehu in New Zealand.

Health challenges have had Ken and Fran slow down. Hiking has become walking and exploring the world is now done through books. Meeting new people and hearing their stories is still a huge source of pleasure for Ken. That's what attracted him to PROBUS.

She showed an early aptitude for acting and when it was suggested she follow those instincts, she promptly dropped out of school. She became the face for Chanel No. 5 perfume. She shared the screen with Husband \#1 in EYES WIDE SHUT.

Who is she?


Grant Cameron was our first speaker of 2024. Grant took us through his life as a cellist and choir member. He grew up in a family where music was always present. His mother was a music teacher and both he and his brother found their careers in music. When he was 6 -years-old, his mother took him to a junior orchestra rehearsal. He was enthralled. He told his mother he wanted to play the cello. After completing his grade one piano exam, he received his first cello. His first conductor at Mount Royal College in Calgary was John Sebastian Bach, a 15th generation descendant. Grant's career in music took him across Canada and the world in tours.
Grant was a charter member of the National Arts Centre Orchestra. He talked about the challenges faced by the committee organizing this new orchestra. Planning included finding musicians and a conductor, choosing the repertoire of music to be played, building a management team and so on. It was fascinating to learn about the detailed logistics related to the orchestra performing around the world. It is a very intricate job.
Having embraced his life as a cellist, the official diagnosis of Essential Tremor in 1991 was devastating. In spite of that diagnosis, he was able to continue playing until 1998. It was a condition that had been noticed as early as his young teen years. At his wife's suggestion, he transitioned to the vocal side of music, singing with choirs such as the Ottawa Choral Society and the Ewashko Singers. This kept him heavily involved in the Ottawa Classical music scene. We enjoyed hearing an excerpt of Grant playing the cello and of his singing Sea Fever, both from recordings on a CD.

Grant Cameron performed as a cellist and as a choral member on the opera stage of the NAC for 50 consecutive years. He counts himself as incredibly blessed, even though he was constantly asked, "What is your real job?"
