Susan Menzies, our March speaker, had a topic dear to the heart of many members, the first twenty-five years of the Ottawa Heart Institute. Susan gave us the good news - the average age for a heart attack is rising - and the bad news - one in three Ottawans will have recourse to the Institute at some time.

Questions came from all sides throughout the talk, including some from members who had been through procedures and some from members who want to avoid them. The most telling example was of a by-pass patient of 25 years ago who said he woke up to find Dr. Keon looking down at him and telling him that he had to change his lifestyle. "No smoking or drinking or fatty foods." "Will I live longer?" "No, but it will seem longer."

Susan brought with her some of the tools of the trade - a tube that is fed through the arteries to perform an angioplasty and a Jarvik heart.

Any members who would like to take Susan up on her offer of a tour of the Heart institute should contact Jim Rader who will handle the coordination so that we make up parties of 5 or 6 rather than burdening the Institute.

They are stories of ordinary men called upon to perform extraordinary acts in conditions which, even with George's lucid descriptions, can probably not be fully comprehended by anyone who was not there.
