Egypt and the Middle East

Our speaker on January 25th was the Ambassador of the Arab Republic of Egypt, Dr. Mahmoud El-Saeed. He started out with mentioning the term "Middle East" meant different things at different times, depending on the colonial power defining it. Countries from Turkey to Afghanistan fall within most definitions. Quite often the Middle East is perceived by outsiders as one monolithic entity. It isn't. Each country has its own characteristics. Sudan differs from Iran, Jordan from Iraq, Saudi Arabia is distinctly different. Each country also has unique relationships

with others in the area. Syria's ties with Lebanon, Egypt's relations with Israel, and the Iraqi and Afghan experiences all impact the area differently. The ambassador stressed the importance of recognizing these differences and not allowing problems in one area to affect one's outlook on the Middle East as a whole. For instance, Egypt's main industry, tourism, is adversely affected when troublesome issues, arising thousands of kilometres from its borders, are linked to Egypt. Likewise, oil, often associated as a Middle East commodity, is much more abundant in some countries than others.

trying to improve the area. Current developments in Palestine are of vital concern to Egypt. Egypt's progressive relationship with Israel has been well ambassador offered insights into the role of diplomats, like himself, in the process. Details on the road map to peace are worked out behind closed doors. Organizations like the Arab League become involved. Public reaction has to be very carefully gauged, as populations in the Middle East tend to respond much more emotionally than, for example, in Canada.

The ambassador, free from the presence of reporters, replied "en famille" to several questions from our members. His response to a question about how suicide

bombers can do the things they do revealed that true Muslims and Christians alike abhor the practice. Another question, related to the recent deaths in Cairo of Sudanese protestors, evoked details not reported in the press. Egypt gave Sudan its independence in 1952 but now had 3 million Sudanese in Egypt competing for jobs and housing, and adding to traffic congestion. Recently a group of 3000 held a 'sit down' in the middle of Cairo demanding to be sent to Canada. This totally blocked traffic and the squatters were unable to understand that the desired emigration to Canada was nothing more than a false rumour.

What started as a rowdy protest became violent. The ambassador expressed an impassioned resolve that everything possible should be done to prevent such tragedies from happening again.

The Aswan Dam was the subject of another question. The Ambassador commented that it is not a total success and even with a complex irrigation system only 10% of Egypt's land area is usable. A deterrent to development of more land is the presence of over 20 million mines, left from WW II, which cause a casualty every day.

Dr. Saeed would like Canada to expand its role in the On the diplomatic front, Egypt is very much involved in Middle East. Canada is seen as having no ambitions in the area and no hidden agenda. He spoke very favourably of Prime Minister Pearson's efforts and the role of Canadian peacekeepers. He expressed his hope that our documented since Sadat's visit to Jerusalem. The newly elected government will take advantage of Canada's reputation.

Probe Us - Jean Lupton

Our investigative reporter discovered that Jean is a member of a regular Kaffee Klatch. Once primed, the other members did the quizzing and all *The Probe* had to do was to sit, take notes and enjoy the coffee.

Member of Kaffee Klatch: Where were you born?

JL: Kingston – on the Thames near Kew Gardens and Hampton Court.

MoKK: When did you come to Canada and why?

JL: In 1955, my brother, Derek, was recruited by Northern Electric in Toronto. Five years later he came home and persuaded me to try it.

MoKK: Did you settle in Toronto.

JL: By no means! On the boat I had met two x-ray technicians on their way to the Montreal General. Their plan was to save like crazy for 6 months, buy a vehicle and then travel around North America. I arrived in November, spent Christmas with my brother and then went to Montreal by New Year's. Six months later, four girls started a six month camping journey through Canada, the U.S. and Mexico. MoKK: Where were you working?

JL: Alcan. That's where I was for the first six months and they took me back again. I liked Montreal but while I was saving for the trip, I had not had much of a social life, and didn't take advantage of being in the city.

MoKK: When did you meet John?

JL: We met at a ski cottage. John came to Canada when he was recruited by the Bank of Montreal. He had trained as a hospital administrator but became fed up with the National Health Service. After he completed his commitment to the bank, he took a position at the Royal Vic – this was in 1964, the year we were married.

MoKK: Family?

JL: We have two sons, both born in Montreal before we moved to Trenton in 1970.

MoKK: Was this another hospital job?

JL: Yes. We were there until 1985 when John moved to the Perley. I did some municipal contract work for a neighbouring municipality. I had several jobs after we moved to Ottawa. I was on the Committee of Adjustment for some time and from '88 to '96 I was at Ellwood House, at St. Thomas' Church, as the Manager/Administrator.

MoKK: And now?

JL: I retired when John did in 1996 so that we would be free to travel.

MoKK: Apart from travel, what are your interests?

JL: Cooking, reading and gardening and, of course, the dog.

MoKK: What kind?

JL: A Lab. We have always had Labradors, even before we had children. John looks after the dog and I look after everything else, except in summer – John cuts the grass and trims the hedges.

JL: I like travel books and biographies – especially political biographies. For fiction, I like Ken Follett and Mary Higgins Clark.
