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To grow old gracefully ...

... was the reason our January guest, **Kathleen Pett**y, gave for her career shift from television to radio. For anyone who has listened to *As it Happens, Cross-Country Checkup* or, more recently *Ottawa Morning*, and *The House* hearing her talk at Probus was a comfortably familiar experience. For *Newsworld* viewers it was like a visit from an 'old' friend.



After a few brief introductory remarks, Kathleen turned the tables on herself by allowing us to interview her. She started her career in Medicine Hat where she had to 'do anything and everything' - this included hosting a cooking show based on the new, in 1986, cooking device, the microwave oven. Her next stop was in Regina, but in 1989 *Newsworld* started and, again, it was a 'do everything' situation. Kathleen noted that, "You quickly learn what you do well and what you don't do well."

Q - On cooking shows

"I produced cooking shows but I am not a cook. Usually we did four shows in a row so it was a case of eat the food, wash-up and start over. Mr. Dressup was on one show where we did microwave food for children."

Q - On staff

"The crew are amazing - professional and dedicated. They get the right stories and the right guests. The producer's job is to look at the whole show and the assistant producers look at their individual segments. It's a 'forest and trees' thing.

Q - On a typical day

"I arrive at 5am, go on air at 8:37, at 10 we start work on the next day's show, at 1 we have a review. I watch a lot of news TV - Don Newman at 5 and the Mike Duffy repeat at 8, and CNN. The Harper government likes to announce things late, so Friday is a working evening, often to 11:30. In between I read, read, read. Being unmarried and no kids (just a dog) I can spend the time. It's not a job, it's a lifestyle."

Q - On "no shows"

"This is very rare. We do have some taped stories 'just in case' but even yesterday when two guests were stuck in traffic due to the weather, we still managed to do the interviews - one by cellphone and one from a payphone. Taped interviews have a different feel. They are not as much fun. Although *The House* is all taped, *Ottawa Morning* is 90% live. The longer I've been here the less we use tape."

Q - On politicians

"Politicians only come on if they think they have something to gain. They are well protected by their communications people. Dalton McGuinty called us to say he would be willing to appear. George Smitherman tried to deliver a prepared speech and resented being interrupted by my questions. After I explained our respective roles there was a silence. The callers after that show, and we do get a lot of calls, were almost unanimously against Smitherman. All politicians spin. You know when you've asked the right question if the guest does not answer right away. They have a script. You have to unbalance them."

Q - On interviews

"We need to establish a goal for an interview. By the time we go on air, the Associate Producers have already had a pre-interview, so I have a few specific questions prepared. Beyond that I prefer discussion to interviews. If you have fully prepared script, you tend to be reading the next question instead of listening to the guest. This can lead to difficulties."

Q - On the Ottawa audience

"I was surprised how quickly I was accepted. On my first ratings we were close to the best the show had ever had. The next one was a little better. The third blew past it and the fourth was even better. The similar shows in Toronto and Calgary get 9-10% and 7-8% audience share. In Ottawa we get 30% which is a little scary. The Ottawa audience has some firm opinions and they are happy to share them with you.

Elizabeth Bowen thanked Kathleen and commented, "Now we understand why your audience share is going up."

Kathleen mentioned her visit on her Thursday show and was very complimentary to Probus.

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Probus Finances

Our club's revenues are comparable to those of previous years. Revenues are recorded in the month they are received and Expenditures are recorded in the month paid.

Probus Centre fees for 2005 were paid in 2006 which explains the higher figure in 2006 when compared to fees paid in 2007. However, the lower 2007 fee shows lower paid membership than in the previous year.

The only unusual expenditure was \$912 to purchase a digital projector which is expected to receive increased use in the future.

With all the talk about identity theft and the need to keep personal information private, the options are: burning, shredding or hoarding.

We looked into having a mobile shredder van coming on one of our meeting days but they would charge \$15 per box and it might cause a traffic jam in the parking lot. We looked a bit further and found the Loeb Centre. The Centre is a non-profit business providing work for persons with developmental disabilities. Their operation is at 161 Donald Street, just east of the Vanier Parkway. As you drive in, their building is to the left and material for shredding is accepted at the far door.

Hours of operation are 9 to 12 and 1 to 3:30, Monday through Friday. The cost is 30¢ per pound (minimum \$5) and shredded material is recycled.

He also made news as the champion of helmets for cyclists; during an anthrax scare on Parliament Hill; and on the use of cosmetic pesticides.

Since August 2005 he has been the CEO of the Champlain Local Health Integration Network.
