Making a Difference - Afghanistan

Mike Cherrier introduced out October 'Remembrance' speaker, LCol Bob Chamberlain to over 100 members and guests.

LCol Chamberlain is a Gunner in the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. He served an extended tour in Afghanistan and his pride in the people he worked with and served with was apparent throughout his talk. As commander of the Kandahar Provincial Reconstruction Team, he led 350 people of which the majority were infantry and the rest included operations, other Government Departments and Engineers/Designers. His environment was partly war fighting and partly reconstruction. He had the toughest Province in the country - the Taliban definitely do not want Canadians there.

Bob regards some of the successes as: development of the Afghan National Army (ANA); improvements in education and health; infrastructure work and increased security. The ANA work alongside Canadians on patrols and do well but building up a national army is not an overnight task. Afghans are involved in many of the infrastructure projects which may range from clearing canals and wells to building bridges. This provides jobs, teaches skills and gives a sense of 'ownership' of the end product.

Almost daily interaction with the Provincial Governor and his Chief of Staff ensures that there is an integrated and coherent approach to every project. Mentoring the Kandahar police and prison guards improves their capabilities. Working with women's groups and international and Afghan non-government organizations gives a positive contrast to the actions of the Taliban.

During his term there were 32 fallen. 570 patrols almost 5 a day at times - took his people into harm's way.

Bob responded to many questions:

-the influence of Al Qaida is minimal - financial support only;

-of his 350 people, half-a-dozen speak the local language, the climate established is more important than language, they rely on local interpreters (with checks);

-police are attacked and killed because they represent progress and present targets of opportunity;

-the poppy crop could be burned down but it represents the farmers' (and their villages') livelihood;

-when the insurgents are driven out prosperity increases. As an example, Kandahar airport now handles international traffic.

The overall impression left by LCol Chamberlain was that Canada is doing something very worthwhile.

Annual General Meeting November 26, 2008

The AGM was convened at 10:00 with sufficient members to form a quorum, Wib Neal (President) in the chair.

President's Report



Wib gave a quick review of the year's activities and thanked the Management

Committee members for their work to keep the club running smoothly. These included Ada McEwan, Audrey Reekie and their several helpers in the kitchen; John Wright for the program and for *The Probe*; Dorothy MacIntosh and her team of telephone callers; Ed Borza and Allan Porter our two Treasurers; Bob Atchison, our Secretary; Bayne Pearen, who sends out cards to members who are not well; Paul Stumes, Merle Brown and Claude Hannan on membership and others who helped out in many ways with the odd jobs that crop up.

Financial Business

Allan Porter noted that the financial statements for the last complete year (2007) were printed in *The Probe* and that the 2008 report will be in the February *Probe*. The interim position is that there are no unusual expenses or income in the current year and that we are solvent.

No other business was raised and the meeting concluded well inside the allotted 30 minutes.

Making a Difference - Ottawa

Jackie Holzman went into politics to make a difference. In 1982 she felt that Ottawa was a great city but that she could help to make it better so she ran in Richmond Ward and was elected to Council. After three terms as Alderman and two as Mayor, Jackie moved on and has been Chairman of the Congress Centre, Chair of the Ottawa Health Research Institute and, for the last year, has served on the board of the NCC as well as devoting her 'spare time' to charitable causes in the city.

Alderman Holzman immediately recognized the pervasive influence of the NCC - they 'own' 470 square km - 10% of the land area of the National Capital Region (NCR) - as well as 130 buildings. Had they been a commercial operation they would have paid the going rate in municipal taxes but instead they paid 'Grants in lieu' - which the city never considered adequate. With so much of the NCR under their control the NCC added an extra layer to any major planning. Jackie gave 8 reasons why she had suggested that the NCC be disbanded. They ranged from its secrecy and dissatisfaction with the plans for the Daly building site and Lebreton Flats, to the production of a beautiful film about Ottawa which never mentioned 'Ottawa'.

Today's NCC is very different. It is much more open. There will be a public meeting on December 3rd* at the Hilton, Lac Leamy where many members of the public will want to address the Board.

Some of the issues on the future NCC agenda include:

- the possibility of developing some of the Greenbelt,
- a botanical garden in the experimental farm,
- the location of another bridge to Gatineau,

- facilitating the coordination of the Gatineau and Ottawa transit systems.

The NCC is the natural body to undertake interprovincial studies as it is the only organization that has planning authority on both sides of the Ottawa River. A fascinating twist to the approval process is that these decisions will ultimately be made by the Board despite more than half of the members being from across Canada and not NCR residents!

Jackie concluded by saying that her goal is to make Ottawa a capital that becomes the 2nd home town of all Canadians, so that families and school groups want to visit their nation's treasures. "I would like all people who live and work here to take pride in a city that is clean, green and safe."

Joyce Wright introduced Jackie and Lenore Porter thanked her on our behalf.

In many ways and for many reasons we will be sorry to leave but the stairs have become an increasing difficulty for some members so we are moving on.

Bus Service to GPC

Gloucester Presbyterian Church is served by bus routes 98, 114 and 143.



Route 143 is a short haul local service. If you need to use it, you probably know it.

Route 98 starts at Tunney's Pasture (9:04), goes through 'Downtown' and then on the South Transitway through Hurdman (9:21), Billings Bridge and Greenboro (9:32) and finishes on local roads to the church (9:45). This is the first bus in the morning from Tunney's Pasture. Before this, the route starts at Greenboro. The interval is 18 minutes.

Route 114 starts at Hurdman (9:15) takes the East Transitway to St Laurent (9:19) then follows St Laurent southwards - with a slight detour at Elmvale Acres Shopping Centre (9:28) - to Conroy (9:35). It heads east from Conroy before heading west and crossing Conroy on Lorry Greenberg and arriving at about 9:45. The intervals are weird and the previous and next busses quit at St Laurent and Conroy (about 1km away).

The bus stop numbers are 4326 (98) and 4322 (114) so you can call OCTranspo (560-1000) any morning (M-F) about 11 and find out the times of the return busses.


February 25th - Jim Watson
