Jim Kingston was at the Club's initial meeting in September 1999 and a regular attendee since then until his recent illness. Our profile of Jim (October 2001) says that he was a Maritimer, his studies at UNB were interrupted by war service, he married Phyllis the day after he graduated (1948), took a Masters in Forestry at Yale and had a career as a 'Resource Economist'. After 5 years with the BC Government and 5 years with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the UN in Geneva, Jim joined the Federal Government, retiring from External Affairs in 1988.

Bob Bailey was a member almost as long. He was introduced to the club by Jim Rader in November 1999. Bob graduated from the University of Alberta as a Civil Engineer. He worked with the city of Calgary and with city and regional governments in Hamilton before coming to Ottawa in 1976 as Commissioner of Community Development, retiring in 1987. The notice in the Citizen mentions Bob's considerable talents as a handyman, confirmed by Jim Rader as the two of them worked together on several bathroom renovation projects for themselves and others.

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An Infrastructure Program For Canada

Gerry Maffre, Director General - Communications, Infrastructure Canada, gave us a review of the government's infrastructure plan - a topic which was timely

in April and is still a hot item of political discussion as Canada fights its way out of the financial crisis. One of the important things he cleared up was the difference between the "Building Canada" program and "Canada's Economic Action Plan".

"Building Canada" is a multi-year program initiated in 2007 with the national priorities of improving highways, drinking water, wastewater, public transit and providing green energy. Eligible investments are in three areas, 'Growing Economy' (including transportation and communications), 'Cleaner Environment' (including public transit and waste management), and 'Strong Communities' (including water, culture, sport and local roads). The funding is \$33 billion over 7 years.

"Canada's Economic Action Plan", worth \$12 billion over 2 years plus a 'green fund' of \$1 billion and other components, was presented in the 2009 budget. It was developed as an immediate way of stimulating the economy. The emphasis is on 'shovel ready' projects.

In Ottawa, a highly visible project is the construction of the new Congress Centre although as of our June meeting what we have seen so far is the destruction of

the old one. This is one of about 300 projects in Ontario, an important one being the development of a new Windsor/Detroit border crossing.

Gerry set the stage by reviewing some of the infrastructure problems facing Canada. 60% of buried infrastructure (water, sewers, hydro, communications) is 50 years old and 28% is more than 80 years old, which accounts for the burst water mains which often disrupt traffic and the bad news stories of sewage overflows. A major part of the problem is the 'out of sight, out of mind' approach which has seen a decline in infrastructure spending from 2.5% of GDP in the 1960's to 1% in the late 1990's. An instantaneous fix - if that were possible is estimated to cost somewhere in the range of \$50 to \$125 billion.

Canada is not alone in having these problems. The US estimates are that \$US1.6 trillion is needed over the next 5 years. Australia has launched a "Build Australia" program of about \$A20 billion (\$C18 billion). The U.K. State of the Nation Report (2006) says that the overall state of most infrastructure is rated 'low average'.

Perhaps the silver lining to the financial crisis is that everyone - individuals, municipalities, provinces and the feds are using stimulus money to modernize and improve homes and infrastructure which will bring benefits and reduced maintenance costs in the future.

Gerry was introduced by his father, Jim, a club member, who talked to us at our July 2005 meeting, making this our first father/son pairing of speakers.

How to find us
