Darcy McGee and the Fenians

If Dr. David Shanahan's talk had been reviewed as fiction it would have been dismissed as "too far fetched". Rebellion. flight, war, politics and murder were all part of Darcy McGee's story. Born in Comerford, Ireland, in 1825, McGee emigrated to the US when he was 17. He returned to Ireland a few years later and became involved with the Fenians. At this time. Ireland was the most densely populated country in Europe

with a population of about 11 million - nearly three times today's numbers. After the *Young Irelander* rebellion in 1848, McGee avoided arrest by fleeing to the United States.

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10-minute Talks

Medals, homes, a watchdog, countries and opera. Possibly operas could be found for each of the other four but there is no apparent connection except that they were the subjects of the 10-minute talks before our picnic.

Mike Charrier started off with a story of heroism in the Spanish-American War. There was some expectation that this would be about Teddy Roosevelt charging up San Juan Hill, but no! Two long-boats rowed close to the shore at Cienfuegos and, under heavy fire, grappled two trans-Atlantic telegraph cables connecting Cuba with Spain. They rowed away from the shore, sliding the cables through the grapples until they were far enough from the shore to make repairs difficult and then cut the cables. Two sailors were killed and 4 marines plus the officer in-charge, were wounded. Two Canadians in the boats, a sailor and a marine, were awarded the Medal of Honor, America's highest military honour.

Ed Borza followed with a talk on *Habitat for Humanity*. Although *HfH* was not formally founded until 1976, the work was started by Linda and Millard Fuller in Georgia

McGee's Funeral

"It is April, 1868, and politics is already a fierce and contentious topic in the brand new nation. One of the Fathers of Confederation, D'Arcy McGee, struck down by an assassin's bullet, is accorded an enormous public funeral down Montreal's St. James Street. By 9:00 am the streets are crowded to suffocation with 60,000 mourners. The stores and offices are shut tight. At least 20,000 men march in the funeral procession, which takes close to three hours to pass by."

The Fenians opposed the British rule of Ireland and, over the years, carried that opposition to Canada where they launched the "Fenian Raids". Many of the Fenians had taken part in the American Civil War and were battle hardened veterans. Their aim was to bring down the Canadian Government and establish a new country. There were five raids between 1866 (Campobello and Fort Erie) and 1871 (Pembina, North Dakota - intended for Winnipeg). The raids were generally abortive but were one of the factors which caused the formation of Canada in 1867.

By the time McGee moved to Canada (1857) he was a seasoned newspaperman and founded the *New Era* in Montreal. He hoped to be part of the creation of a new nation which would be free of the sectarianism of Ireland and he became opposed to the Fenian Movement which he had once supported. He was a natural politician, being willing to talk at length on any given subject whether he knew any thing about it or not, and was elected to the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Canada in 1858. Within a decade he became one of the 'Fathers of Confederation'.

McGee's assassination, by a pistol bullet to the head, was supposedly by a Fenian supporter, Patrick James Whelan. Dr. Shanahan disputes this and was very critical of the circumstantial evidence and the trial procedure which led to Whelan's conviction and hanging.

In responding to the many questions, Dr. Shanahan noted that the Irish formed the largest ethnic group in Canada at the time of Confederation. The consequence of their decision to be part of Canada and not to foster a breakaway country led directly to the Canada we know today. When asked to project the experience of the Irish to the current immigration of Indians, Pakistanis, Somalis, etc. who have also left behind their homeland and everything they grew up with, he commented that there were two basic needs. The need for them to give up some of their ways and the need for Canadians to be more accepting.

John Wright introduced Dr. Shanahan and Paul Stumes thanked him on our behalf. We were given a direct connection to the Fenian Raids when Audrey Reekie showed us the sword carried by her great-grandfather in defence of Canada against the raiders. We know of at least one member who visited Darcy McGee's Pub, on Sparks Street, for further research.


(US) in 1968. They started to build homes and, using the bible's teachings on usury, the homes were sold without profit but on a 20-year mortgage. Between 1976 and 2000, 100,000 homes were built and over the next 8 years, 200,000 more, in 96 different countries. *HfH* relies very heavily on volunteers and one of the reasons that the organization is so successful is that it allows and encourages any adult to come and work. *HfH* does not get any Government funds, but it will accept gifts of land. On a local note, in 2003, 8 homes were built in Ottawa in one week.

The background to **Ken Dye**'s talk was a series of cartoons featuring Ken and some of the politicians with whom his work as *Parliament's Watchdog* (looking very fierce in the first cartoon) brought him in contact -

Austria are fairly short steps from their origins but Germany and Russia took a little more explaining. Deutschland comes from a 7th century word *diutisc* meaning 'the language spoken by the people'. The 'people' became differentiated as 'peasants (or slaves)' and 'nobility'. The nobility were 'Herr', hence Herrmann and a short step to German. 'Red' is often associated with modern Russia and communism. Paul told us that the name started from a small race of predominantly redheaded people which long ago disappeared or were assimilated. These *Rosiy* somehow gave the name to the many ethnic groups and the huge country which is now Russia. This makes good sense to many Europeans rouge (Fr), roja (Sp), rose (En) and russo (It) all mean red.

When the NAC cancelled its Summer Opera Festival in

1984 it looked as though the National Capital would be an opera wasteland. Opera Lyra Ottawa was formed the following year and has now grown into a highly-rated professional company. **Ute Davis**, a board member of OLO, showed some spectacular slides from several of its productions



sometimes more clash than contact. We're not here to relax ... we're in training for a Senate appointment". As a footnote, when the High Commission sold off the memberships (Ken's influence), they made a profit!

Hungary is a country of Ungars. Germany is a country of Hermanns. Russia is a variant on 'red' and Austria is a simplification of Osterreich. **Paul Stumes** explained all these telling us the steps through which history and circumstance developed the modern names. Hungary and
