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January Speakers

Our club was pleased to welcome Sue Kennedy from the Alzheimer Society of Ottawa and Renfrew County to address us on how we can (should?) sustain healthier brains, followed by Caroline Midgley from Seniors on Site (SoS) who provided an outline of what SoS can do to obtain support caregivers for seniors with assisted living in their own homes.

Sue started by listing behavioural indicators of the onset dementia, leading to Alzheimer's in 50 to 70 percent of the time. This is a disease that can affect as much as 25% of seniors between 80 and 85 years old. This shows how important it is that we reduce our risk by taking action for a healthier brain. Sue followed on by providing helpful guidance on what a caregiver can do (and should not do) in helping the dementia sufferer.

Caroline followed, telling us of the carefully scrutinized resources that can be made available to help caregivers cope with their role, including when seeking respite from the never-ending need to provide care and support.

The presentation was made all the more effective and interesting by the 'to and fro' questions and comments from the listening audience.

With so many amongst us having concerns about dementia, whether personally or as a care provider and all that this entails, very useful detailed information is available from each of the two agencies.

Bob Braham

We had a sidebar to the article on Bob Braham in the December *Probe* which was squeezed out at the last minute.



Bob Braham was the most decorated British Commonwealth fighter pilot of WW II. His medal set (1 to r) is: Distinguished Service Order (DSO) (3 times), Distinguished Flying Cross (DFC) (3 times), Air Force Cross, Battle of Britain Medal, France & Germany Medal, WW II Medal, Canadian Forces Decoration (CD), Belgian Order of Leopold and Croix de Guerre.

The medals are on display at the RAF Museum in Hendon and Mike Braham (our November speaker) has a set of miniatures.

Group Captain Braham was born at Holcombe in Somerset on April 6th, 1920. His father, a Methodist minister, was a pilot in the Royal Flying Corps in World War I. *The Manse* in Holcombe, the Braham's family home is now a U.K. Heritage Site in recognition of his Royal Air Force Career.

Bob Braham wrote of his experiences in a book "Scramble" ("Night Fighter" in the US). In the foreword, Air Vice-Marshal Sir Basil Embry wrote, "I have never met anyone to surpass his sheer aggressive fighting spirit and anyone who was more determined to come to grips with the enemy in the air."

Bob Braham died from a brain tumour at the age of 53.

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March 22nd - Louise Profeit-Leblanc "Tse Duna " Master Storyteller

Louise is a Traditional Storyteller from the **Nacho Nyak Dun** First Nation (First Nation of the Big River People) in the Yukon. Many of her stories are about the strength and importance of women within the community and their significant role as first educators of children. Her association with many elders has resulted in her gaining the responsibility and honour of becoming a "Story Keeper".

Louise worked as Coordinator of the Aboriginal Arts Office at the Canada Council for the Arts until her retirement in 2013, a position which allowed her to respond to speaking requests from Aboriginal communities, gatherings and festivals, and to many international venues, including Australia, New Zealand, Wales, Germany, Belize as well as many locations in the US and Canada.
