## **Theatre Life**

**Matthew Behrens** started his talk with a quote from Joan Didion (*The White Album*), "We tell ourselves stories in order to live ..." - and then told us the stories that have shaped his life, a life of and in the theatre.

Matthew's parents were Bernard "Bunny" Behrens and Deborah Cass.

Bunny appeared in over 30 movies from *Swashbuckler* in 1976 to *Anne of Green Gables: A New Beginning* in 2009. This meant that Matthew spent a decade in Hollywood while his father made movies and filled in the gaps with appearances in a dozen TV series including *Colombo, Kojak* and *Little House on the Prairie*. Bunny and Deborah were, at heart, stage actors and performed many times at the Shaw Festival and Stratford.

Matthew illustrated the importance of culture, not just acting but in a wider sense. He took examples from Mexico, where the Teatro Popular has its origins in the days when Mexico was a colony, and Brazil, which issues *culture coupons*, exchangeable for books, etc.; and Radio Dodo in Montreal which serves the Syrian community. (Editor's note; He also mentioned that Farley Mowat fired at American B52's, but I am not sure how that fitted the theme.)

For the past 10 years, Matthew and his wife, Laurel Smith, have run the Perth Classic Theatre Festival,

which started as the *Burning Passions Theatre* in 1999 in Toronto. Their energies are spread to community projects such as the St. Luke's Drop-in Centre where they have put on performances with free seating for those who cannot afford a ticket, and especially PAL Ottawa. PAL (Performing Arts Lodge) was incorporated in 2012 as the 8th Canadian PAL. The organization helps retired actors and artists in their retirement. Even successful actors often find themselves "resting" at times which does lend itself to financial security and pensions.

## **Next Speakers**

#### March 27th - David Rain - Dr. Lotta Hitschmanova



Lotte Hitschmann (1909-1990) was born in Prague, moved to Paris in 1932 to study journalism at the Sorbonne, returning to Prague in 1935 to work as a journalist while gaining her PhD.

The war years took her to Paris, Brussels (adding the Slavic 'ova' to her name) and Marseilles, where she made her first contact with the

Unitarian Service Committee (USC) before escaping Europe on a banana boat from Lisbon to New York and making her way to Canada. In 1945, she formed the Canadian branch of the USC and dedicated her life to raising funds for relief work in many countries. Between 1945 and 1984 the USC raised 130 million dollars through her efforts. In 1968 she was made an Officer of the Order of Canada and promoted to Companion in 1979.

**David Rain** worked with USC Canada from 1992 to 2015, the last 7 years as a fundraiser. In November 2016, David established a blog in honour of Dr Lotta and in March 2018 he started a petition to put Lotta on a Canadian stamp.

#### April 24: Shirley-Ann Pyefinch - Genealogy Update

Shirley-Ann Pyefinch is a records manager for Justice Canada but more interestingly for us, she is the Director, Ottawa Stake Family History Centre, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints on Prince of Wales Drive.
