STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE IN A MUG

This strawberry shortcake mug cake is fluffy, sweet and refreshing. And the best of all - it's really easy and fast to make!

Quarter 4 strawberries, or if they are

very large, cut them into chunks. Place them in a small bowl and sprinkle with **2 tsp sugar**. Stir until the sugar begins to dissolve, set aside.

Place 1 tbsp of butter into a large microwave safe mug and microwave on high for 30-45 seconds or until butter is mostly melted. Remove from microwave and swirl the butter around the bottom and sides of the mug. Add 4 tsp sugar, 5 tbsp flour, 1/2 tsp baking powder, 1/4 cup milk, 1/4 tsp vanilla and a pinch of salt into the mug and stir until smooth and no lumps remain.

Microwave for 1 minute and 15 seconds on high. Remove from microwave and check that the top of the mug is dry. If there is still wet batter on the top of the cake, microwave for another 10 seconds.

Run a knife along the sides of the cake, place a plate on top of the mug and flip over to release the cake onto the plate. Let cool. Cut the cake in half horizontally and top with some whipped cream to your taste. Add about half of the strawberries on top. Place the other half of the cake on top of the strawberries. Add more whipped cream and the rest of the strawberries.

What says summer more than strawberry shortcake with whipped cream!

Profile on Bernetta Starkey

I wasn't going to do a profile on myself until I ran out of others to do first, but then I realized at the last meeting that none of you really know me, so here goes.

I am originally from Montreal, Chateauguay to be exact, and moved to Ontario to follow my husband, Bill McLellan's, career. I told him, 'where you go I will follow but when we retire we move back to Montreal.' No problem he said. So here we are, retired and still in Ontario because the kids and grandkids are here.

I have always been a joiner. I love being a part of a group and sitting on the executive to hear the inside scoop on why the decisions are as they are. When we lived in Cobourg, I thought I would join the Waterfront Festival. They were looking for volunteers and this is the biggest event in Cobourg. It is so big that it even out draws events in Toronto. I thought they would have me parking cars but, nope, they asked if I would chair the event. I have no problem being the person in charge but I told them they had to let me know if there was something they

always had and everyone knows that they always have it and to let me know because having just moved to Cobourg, I didn't know what they always had. From there I chaired the Communities in Bloom contest for Cobourg. They had entered in past years but hadn't won. The mayor said that everyone who she might ask was either on holiday or off sick and would I take it on. I know nothing about gardens but I can organize.

I drove around town just looking at people's gardens. Then I would get out to knock on a door to compliment the gardening. The homeowner would be so pleased and ask if I knew Joe Blow. I didn't but she made a call and gave me the address. From one garden to another, I was making my way across town and seeing gardens in the back of people's houses that I would never have seen from the road.

Once I planned my route, I asked some homeowners to be home at a certain time so we could stop with the judges. I knew a gentleman who belonged to an antique car club and had them park their vehicles along the route. I borrowed a car from a car dealership, they put their signage on the car and drove the judges along my route. We came to the first person on my stop and got out of the car to see this gentleman's backyard garden. The judges were astonished to find out they knew him and had always wondered where he had gone! This made a connection between the judges and Cobourg that I could not have manufactured. We won that contest hands down.

Our priest asked if I would take on the cemetery. I thought how hard could this job be, they're all dead. It was the most politically charged job I ever did and I learned so much. We had a robust Italian community that are accustomed to being buried above ground in crypts. The priest gave them an old stone shed to convert to a mausoleum. They had masons among their community and felt they didn't need to hire a mausoleum builder, they could do the work themselves. Turns out, you might be able to build a house but those skills don't transfer to mausoleums.

Eventually the mausoleum was finished with ten crypts for full body burials and a niche wall for ashes. One gentleman was interred into one of the crypts and within days the mausoleum was smelling awful. We had fans going, candles burning, the doors open - nothing would help. We had to bring the mausoleum builder in to fix the problem. He was a chatty fellow who loved his work. They also had not angled the floor of each crypt toward the drain so the gentleman interred was pooling where he was and only if the pool became big enough did it make it to the drain. The very expensive mausoleum specialist fixed all the problems but we left the gentleman interred alone. Then the fellow told me, "By the way. By the way, don't put anyone in these crypts in a steel coffin. There are far more stories I could tell but we will suffice it to say I learned so much.

The neighbouring town of Port Hope asked if I would help with their Float Your Fanny Down the Ganny Festival. The Ganaraska River had flooded the town many years previous and every spring they would have this festival to commemorate it. The kayakers and canoers were serious about the time they took to get down the river but the crazy craft didn't care. They were just there for the fun. Early spring meant late March to early April when the river was running at its peak and it could be snowing. The rafters had water guns and sprayed everyone on the shore and the people on the shore returned the favour. It was a lot of fun. Then we would all end up in the Ganaraska Hotel. Calling it a dive is being very polite. When you ordered a drink your choice was only beer and it only came in a pitcher. And if I saw the kitchen door swing open and saw them emptying leftover pitchers into my pitcher, that was what I expected. We looked upon this event as our annual inoculation.

Because of these events, Bill has had to step in as Santa Claus Polk-A-Roo and stage manage the bandshell of entertainers. He got to meet The Friendly Giant, much to my chagrin. Again, another tremendous learning opportunity.

I have thoroughly enjoyed every activity I have been a part of and I encourage everyone to get out there and join something. The rewards are far more than you will ever guess.






SPEAKERS WANTED


