GORGONZOLA STUFFED CHICKEN BREASTS **WRAPPED** IN BACON

"Cheese and bacon. Need we say more?"

Preheat the oven to 375°F. Spray an 8x8 baking dish with cooking spray.

Using a sharp knife, cut a slit into the thick side of each 2 skinless, boneless chicken breasts, about 2 inches long and 1-1/2 inches deep.

Mash together 1/4 cup crumbled Gorgonzola cheese, 2 tbsp fresh parsley, 2 tbsp minced shallots, 1 minced garlic **clove** in a small bowl. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Fill each chicken breast pocket with Gorgonzola mixture. Wrap 2 slices of bacon around each breast. Secure with wooden toothpicks. Place chicken breasts into the prepared baking dish.

Bake until bacon is browned and chicken is no longer pink inside, about 35 minutes. A thermometer inserted into the centre of the breast should read at least 165°F.











The Ontario Waste Management Association website is counting down the days, hours, minutes and seconds until Ontario's landfill sites are full. At this moment the countdown shows 4007 days, 19 hours, 37 minutes, 18 seconds. 4007 days is just short of 11 years until those sites are closed. Rachael Jones will explain the waste management plan for Ottawa and how we can participate. The City is in development of a Master Plan to be completed in 2023.

THURSDAY FEBRUARY 16 12:30pm



If you dislike the Queensway, take Baseline to Robertson, through Bells Corners, continue to Terry Fox and turn right.




PAINTING WITH GRACE



There will be some changes made to the constitution. We will keep you informed on those changes. Probus tries to be a very inclusive club and I am certain the changes are to reflect those values. More to come.



In 1978, Nancy Edwards left as a CUSO volunteer for Sierra Leone, where she spent three years working as a community health nurse and two years evaluating primary health care programs. Her stories of village life convey the ravages of tuberculosis; threats of witchcraft; and tragedies of deaths related to pregnancy, childbirth, and newborn tetanus. She



celebrates local advocates for health improvements-mothers, traditional birth attendants, and village health committees.

Acutely aware of her role as a cultural outsider, the author reveals how she learned about the power of ancestors and the women's Secret Society among the Mende people. Four decades after her arrival in Sierra Leone, Edwards comes to grips with her stance on the cultural practice of female circumcision. She takes us

behind-the-scenes, describing how her West African experiences shaped her life and research career.

Though steeped in hardship, tension, and conflict, Not One, Not Even One is buffered by humour, heartened by breakthroughs and shifting perspectives, and propelled by fierce hopes for the future.
