STRAWBERRY-CABERNET BARBECUE SAUCE

Fresh berries make an unbeatable base for an easy homemade barbecue sauce

Heat 1 tbsp canola oil in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Add 1/2 chopped onion and season with Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste. Cook, stirring occasionally, until golden brown (7 to 9 minutes).

Stir in 3/4 cup quartered strawberries and 1/2 cup of Cabernet Sauvignon.

Increase heat to medium-high and cook until berries soften (3 to 4 minutes).

Add 1/3 cup apple cider vinegar, 1/4 cup cup sugar, 1/4 cup ketchup, 2 tbsp Worcestershire sauce, 1 tbsp maple syrup, 3 chopped cloves of garlic and 1/2 to 1 jalapeno pepper, seeded and diced.

Bring to a boil.

Reduce heat and simmer until slightly thickened (8 to 12 minutes).

Let cool slightly.

Transfer mixture to a blender and puree until smooth (about 30 seconds). Return to pan and simmer, if necessary, until sauce thickens (1 to 2 minutes). Let cool and use to baste grilled chicken, ribs or pork chops.

Craig Greenwood


This month, we will hear from you, our members, on your favourite topics. This is always a fun and interesting speaker forum. We have had a few speakers over the years who have given us a chat on their



SHAKESPEARE IN THE PARK




HAMLET This is what the touring company have to say about *Hamlet*.



We had a last minute change in speakers this month. Our Bonnie Barber had taken a trip with friends to Egypt, Israel, Jordan, United Arab Emerites and Jordan - not in that order. Her friend, Joy Forbes, is a school teacher and had a presentation all ready to go so she made the presentation.

While in Egypt, they visited the city of Luxor and the Valley of the Kings. This is where the famed Tomb of Tut Ankh Amun was discovered in 1922. Tutankhamun died at age 19. For many years it was believed that "the boy king" died of an infected broken leg. However, in 2010, scientists found traces of malaria parasites in Tutankhamun's remains, indicating that malaria, perhaps in combination with degenerative bone disease, may have been the cause of death. He was the stepson of Queen Nefertiti.

In Jordan, they visited Petra where most people will remember the temple built into the rock in the

Indiana Jones movie, THE LAST CRUSADE, with Sean Connery.



They visited Oman where one of the more adventurous ladies in their group decided to take a dune buggy out and ride out into the desert on the dunes.

They then visited the United Arab Emerites which is made up of seven countries: Abu Dhabi, Dubai, Sharjah, Ajman, Umm Al-Quwain, and Fujairah, while the seventh emirate, Ras Al Khaimah, joined the federation in 1972. The capital city is Abu Dhabi, located in the

largest and wealthiest of the seven emirates. One of the most

famous sites is the Palm Islands. The UAE have many famous and outstanding pieces of architecture.

And finally Israel, where the Dome of the Rock shrine and the Western Wall are. There is a great deal of shared history here for Jews, Christians and Muslims. A

definite stop on anyone's visit to the Middle East.





THE WAGER by David Grann

On January 28, 1742, a ramshackle vessel of patchedtogether wood and cloth washed up on the coast of



Brazil. Inside were thirty emaciated men and they had an extraordinary tale to tell. They were survivors of His Majesty's Ship the Wager, a British vessel that had left England in 1740 on a secret mission. While the Wager had been chasing a Spanish galleon, it had wrecked on a desolate island. After being marooned for months and facing starvation, built the flimsy craft

and sailed for more than a hundred days, traversing nearly 3,000 miles of storm-wracked seas. They were areeted as heroes.

But then ... six months later, another, even more decrepit craft landed on the coast of Chile. This boat contained just three castaways, and they told a very different story. The thirty sailors who landed in Brazil were not heroes – they were mutineers!
